

Mark Eaton: Mark was the NBA spokesman in 1986-87 in the "Say No to Drugs" campaign. "What makes things really scary," said Eaton, "is that you've got no guarantee about the purity of a drug gotten from the street. Your personal welfare is absolutely no concern of a dealer. As far as I'm concerned, you might as well swallow a bottle of "Draino". It's suicide to get involved with drugs."

Darrell Griffith: "Peer pressure is what does it" said Darrell Griffith between sets in the weight room. Then he sensed I wanted to talk deeper about the subject. Darrell has studued the drug problems in his community and the nation as a whole. Then, he said what was in his heart.

"Drugs are a slow way of committing suicide. It's like torture for yourself and your family. Greg, the government doesn't understand some things about the drug business. First of all, its the #1 business in the world. You take a young man who's been trying to get a decent job for a couple of years and sees his family in poverty, you can understand the temptation to get involved in drugs. Hey, when all a guy has to do is deliver a few packages and he gets \$5,000 cash per week you're never gonna stop it.

People were always after me to get into drugs. Fortunately, I turned right, but a lot of my buddies turned left. I've got 7 buddies I used to shoot marbles with when I was a little kid who are buried in a cemetary next to my house in Louisville.

You've got to be willing to take some name calling for awhile. It happened to me. People would call me all kinds of names for not doin' drugs but after awhile it stopped and I was never bothered again."
